Park and Open Space Plan Update

The Purpose of the Park and Open Space Plan is to prepare and plan for the Village's future park and recreation needs. Parks and natural spaces not only promote a healthy lifestyle for those who use them, but also enhance the beauty of the area, attract visitors, shape community development patterns, and increase property values. In order to create a high-quality living environment, park land, trails and natural areas need to be maintained.

As these plans are created, the Village takes into account the needs of the region and looks for ways to protect the environment by preserving ecosystems and watersheds.

The Park and Open Space Plan is prepared every five years as a requirement of the Wisconsin Department of Administration to make sure that planning goals, objectives and policies are current.

Updating the plan ensures that it reflects the current needs of the community. This plan fits within the guidelines set forth in the 2035 Comprehensive Plan, and is created in accordance with guidelines set forth by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

By updating the plan, it maintains eligibility for the Village to qualify for grants through the DNR and qualify the Village for matching grant funds through the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund (LAWCON) and the State of Wisconsin Stewardship Fund.

The plan includes general background information and demographics to establish the context surrounding the plan. The document also inventories existing park and recreational facilities in the area, and addresses public input and feedback received in regards to parks and open spaces in the Village. Data gathered is analyzed and used to create

policy and conceptual recommendations to guide future work within the park system.

As new development occurs in the Village, funds from these developments are allocated to parks and open spaces to pay for the future extension of trail connections and parks that would serve the new development. For this reason, feedback from the community is essential to the success of this plan and needed as the updated plan is being shaped. You are invited to attend the Tuesday, March 6 Park Commission meeting at 6:00 p.m. in the Village Hall Auditorium where the schedule and the timeline for updating the plan will be discussed.

Site and Operational Plans



On Monday, January 22, the Pleasant Prairie Plan Commission considered and approved Site and Operational Plans on behalf of Uline for interior building modifications and occupancy of a 417,384 square foot building owned by LakeView XVIII Venture, LLC which is currently under construction by CenterPoint Trust.

The plans are for a fulfillment warehouse located at 11559 80th Avenue in LakeView Corporate Park which is known as Uline I3 Box Depot. The entire building will be used for warehousing and storage of shipping supplies. It is projected that 70 employees will be working at this location, 40 working on first shift and 30 working on second shift. Interior improvements are being made including the addition of a cafeteria, management offices and the addition of 36 dock doors to name a few.

Uline currently operates two corporate headquarter buildings, a conference center, and four distribution warehouses in Pleasant Prairie. Uline is a community partner that believes in high quality customer service and quick delivery of its products. They sell thousands of products through their catalog service to businesses across North America.

"The Village is proud that Uline, a business that is the leading distributor of shipping, package, and industrial supplies is a corporate resident. They are a company that not only offers quality products, but is a responsible employer and is a catalyst for economic growth in the Village," said Jean Werbie-Harris, Village of Pleasant Prairie Community Development Director.

Uline intends to occupy the space when construction is complete by May of 2018. \Box

TID #6 Update

On Monday, February 5, the Pleasant Prairie Village Board considered and approved Resolution #18-03, the project plan and boundaries for the creation of Tax Incremental District No. 6 (TID #6). The second and final meeting of the Joint Review Board to create TID #6 will take place on February 15, 2018. During December and January meetings, the Pleasant Prairie Plan Commission approved the project plan and boundaries of TID #6 and held a public hearing so interested parties could express their views in regards to the district.

The Main Street Market development will be located on a 21 acre mixed-use district, at the northeast corner of the intersection of Highway 165 (104th Street) and Highway 31 (Green Bay Road). Main Street Market could include a grocery store, restaurants, a clinic, a pharmacy, and a gas station/convenience store. The first use, Froedtert South, Inc. has received approvals to build a four-story medical office building and clinic at this location.

If approved by the Joint Review Board, TID #6 will fund public infrastructure improvements on Highway 165, 102nd Street and Old Green Bay Road that will include; roadway extensions and intersections, signal modifications, lane modifications, a water main extension and other utilities. The first phase will be funded with general obligation debt paid with tax increments from the development of Froedtert South, Inc. The second phase will be funded by the developer with no risk to taxpayers.

Anticipated project expenses for work detailed in TID #6 are estimated at \$7,214,750. TID #6 will be established with the purpose of capturing incremental taxes to pay the public debt and Developer Revenue Bond for public infrastructure costs. The expenditure period is 15 years with a maximum life of 20 years, without extensions. The Village will apply revenue from TID #6 to pay off administrative costs, debt services and finally the Developer Revenue Bonds. The Village is proposing to retire TID #6 in 2038. The Project Plan promotes the orderly development of the Village and is in-line with the Master Plan of the Village. TID #6 will help the Village meet goals and objectives set forth in the plan to attract workers and businesses including industrial, commercial and mixed use developments to the Village.

Medication Drop Box

Both anti-drug forces and environmental activists are encouraging people to properly dispose of unused pharmaceuticals. Disposing of pharmaceuticals can make them inaccessible to children or addicts. Disposing of them correctly also keeps them from further contaminating our local drinking water supply.

A permanent medication drop box (available 24/7) is located in the lobby of the Pleasant Prairie Police Department at 8600 Green Bay Road.

A list of acceptable items is printed on the outside of the drop box. *Do not deposit inhalers, needles or sharps in the box.* Please visit *PleasantPrairieOnline.com/services/garbage/quickreference.asp* for information about disposal of needles and sharps.

Please keep medication in its original container, and cross off any personal information, leaving the name of the medication visible.

Thank you for taking care when disposing of medication. \square

If Residential Street Lights are not working...

Village staff requests your help to report non-working street lights in residential neighborhoods. A street light is considered non-working when it is flickering continually, not lighting in the dark, or if the light is on during daylight hours.



Determining Who to Contact

Because some street lights in the Village are maintained by We Energies and some are maintained by Village staff, the first step is determining who to contact for repair. The Village maintains most street lights in

residential neighborhoods. Village street lights should have a numbered sticker affixed to the base of the light pole displaying the words Village of Pleasant Prairie. We Energies street lights have a numbered metal tag on their pole.

Report a Non-Working Street Light

To notify the Village when a street light needs repair, please contact us at *pw@plprairie.com* or at *262.925.6700*. If you're unsure if a non-working light is a Village street light, you can



also contact us. Staff will refer to a street light map and notify the appropriate repair personnel. When you call, we will need to know the intersection or the address of the home nearest the light pole. If visible on the sticker, the pole number is useful as well. Fix a Leak Week: March 19-25, 2018

The Environmental Protection Agency celebrates **Fix a Leak Week** each March to remind you to check household fixtures and irrigation systems for leaks. Household leaks can waste more than one trillion gallons of water annually nationwide. That's equal to the annual household water use of more than 11 million homes. A one gallon per minute leak can add more than half a million gallons per year. Common types of leaks found in the home include worn toilet flappers, dripping faucets, and other leaking valves. These types of leaks are often easily fixed, requiring only a few tools and hardware.

Tips for Identifying Leaks

Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter changes at all, you may have a leak.

Identify toilet leaks by placing a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If any color shows up in the bowl after 10 minutes, you have a leak. (Be sure to flush immediately after the experiment to avoid staining the tank.)

Examine faucet gaskets and pipe fittings for any water on the outside of the pipe to check for surface leaks.



Examine water usage during a colder month, such as January or February. If a family of four exceeds 12,000 gallons per month, there may be serious leaks inside your home from a fixture such as a toilet. □



Sidewalk Reminders



It is the responsibility of every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of property in the Village to maintain and remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of a building or property.

The Village requires removal of snow and ice within 24 hours from the time the snow ceases to accumulate. The ordinance still requires that you sprinkle de-icing material in the event that ice has formed on a sidewalk. Please do not shovel or plow snow and/or ice into Village streets, onto any public sidewalk, or obstruct any fire hydrants. \square

Historical Society Tools of the Trade



Work is now underway to renovate the 1927 two room Dublin School building and transform it into a local museum sponsored by the Pleasant Prairie Historical Society. The museum will feature displays of historical artifacts from the community as well as act as a meeting and event location.

Volunteers are in the demolition stage, preparing the basement for new utilities, bathroom, kitchen and an HVAC system. Among the many volunteers helping at the Dublin School is Jeff Hammelev, a local retired tradesman who recently donated his **Millers Falls brace chuck**, pictured above, that was handed down to him from his father.

The markings on the tool indicate a patent date of 1868 and patent records show the exact date to be January 14, 1868. These tools were made with a rosewood handle and at one time had nine tool bits that were stored in the handle. It is considered to be a woodworking tool and was the invention of Charles H. Amidon, one of the two original founders of Millers Falls Manufacturing Company, which was located in Millers Falls, Massachusetts. The chuck became one of the company's best-selling tools. Not long after its invention, the company began to outgrow its location and needed more waterpower to support the manufacturing of its products and they built a new factory in Greenfield, MA in 1869.
